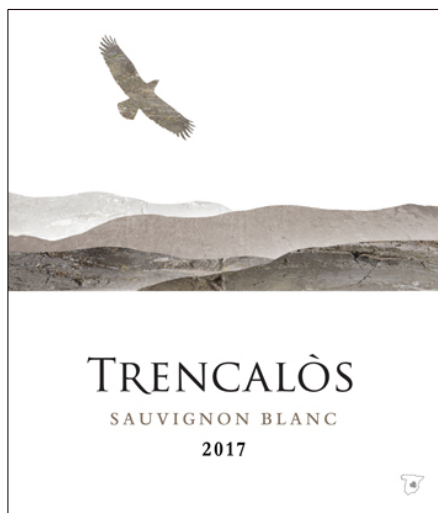


# Trencalós Sauvignon Blanc 2017 (White Wine)



Bodegas Abanico began in the autumn of 2006 when Rafael de Haan and Nuria Altes decided to make their own wine in Celler Batea, Terra Alta. After finding commercial success for their new project they expanded their efforts to include other areas of Spain including Castilla. They realized that they could improve on what was currently being produced by wineries in terms of wine quality and packaging, and create a unique product.

Since 2006 Rafael and Nuria have developed numerous brands from all over Spain and continue to search out great wines, regions and projects to add to their range. Today, they are confident that all of their wines represent true quality, regional authenticity, varietal character, as well as great value.

<b>Grapes</b>	100% Sauvignon Blanc
<b>Altitude / Soil</b>	750 meters / Sandy, lime-rich clay
<b>Farming Methods</b>	Traditional methods
<b>Harvest</b>	Hand and machine harvested fruit
<b>Production</b>	Grapes were destemmed and lightly crushed prior to fermentation in stainless steel tanks at cool temperatures
<b>Aging</b>	Aged for a brief period in stainless steel tanks prior to bottling

## Reviews:

“The 2017 Sauvignon Blanc from Trencalós is a good solid wine, but this particularly bottle was already getting a bit reductive and had a bit of over-cooked asparagus elements starting to poke through on both the nose and palate. With some aeration, this blows off a bit, but it is definitely not the grassy component of the varietal, but is from the closure. Eventually, once the reduction lifts a bit, the wine offers up a nose of grapefruit, lemon, salty soil tones and a topnote of white flowers. On the palate the wine is crisp, medium-full and bouncy, with a solid core and good length and grip on the balanced finish. The reduction hangs a bit longer on the backend than it does in the nose and I would drink this wine up pronto. 2019-2020.”
